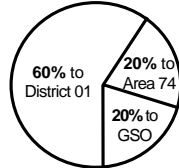

Concept VII

The Conference recognizes that the Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments: that the Trustees are thereby fully empowered to manage and conduct all of the world service affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous. It is further understood that the Conference Charter itself is not a legal document: that it relies instead upon the force of tradition and the power of the A.A. purse for its final effectiveness.

Concepts Checklist

- Do we act responsibly regarding the "power of the purse?"
- Do we realize that the practical and spiritual power of the Conference will nearly always be superior to the legal power of the GSB?

This Concept attempts to clarify the relationship and "balance of powers" between the Conference and the General Service Board. **"This...may look like the collision of an irresistible force with an immovable object."** On the one hand, "the board is invested with complete legal power over A.A.'s funds and services; on the other hand the conference is clothed with such great influence and financial power it could overcome the legal rights of the board.

... As Bill tactfully puts it, the trustees "simply refrain from using their legal right to say 'no when it would be much wiser, all things considered, to say 'yes.'"

This means that the practical power of the Conference will nearly always be superior to the legal power of the Trustees. **This superior power in the Conference flows from the powerful traditional influence of the Charter itself.** It derives from the large majority of group-chosen Delegates in the Conference. And finally, in any great extremity, it would rest upon the undoubted ability of the Delegates to deny the General Service Board the monies with which to operate — viz., the voluntary contributions of the A.A. groups themselves.

When we reflect that our Trustees have no salaried financial interest in their posts, we can be quite sure that such a Board would never think of legally contesting the clear and sustained will of the Conference Delegates and the A.A. areas they represent. **If someday the chips were really down, there would be little chance of a stalemate. The Conference would find itself in complete control of the situation.** As the conscience of A.A., the Delegates would find themselves in ultimate authority over our

4 General Service Board and also its corporate arms of active world service.

As the conscience of A.A., the Delegates would find themselves in ultimate authority over our General Service Board . . .

The history of this development is interesting and important. When in 1950 the Conference Charter was drawn, this question of where the final authority ought to rest was a very moot matter. **Would the Conference have the last word, or would the Trustees?** By then we knew for sure that complete and final authority over our funds and services should never continue to reside in an isolated Board of Trustees who had an unqualified right to appoint their own successors. This would be to leave A.A. world services in the hands of a paternalistic group, something entirely contradictory to the "group conscience" concept of Tradition Two. **If the Trustees were to be our permanent service administrators and the guardians of A.A.'s Twelve Traditions, it was evident that they must somehow be placed in a position where they would necessarily have to conform to our Traditions, and to the desires of our Fellowship.**

We have taken great pains to reserve final authority to the Conference by practical and traditional means.

This arrangement is in strict conformity with the "trusted servant" provision of Tradition Two, which contemplates that **our servants, within the scope of their duties, should be trusted to use their own experience and judgment.** Trusted servants at all A.A. levels are expected to exercise leadership, and leadership is not simply a matter of submissive housekeeping. Of course leadership cannot function if it is constantly subjected to a barrage of harassing directives.

We have taken great pains to reserve final authority to the Conference by practical and traditional means.

Just as the Conference should avoid the overuse of its traditional authority, so should the Trustees avoid overuse of their legal rights.

"If...the Conference will always bear in mind actual rights, duties, responsibilities and legal status of the General Service Board; and if the trustees...will constantly realize that the Conference is the real seat of ultimate service authority...**neither will be seriously tempted to make a 'rubber stamp' out of the other... In this way, grave issues will always be resolved and harmonious cooperation will be the general rule.**"

WHAT'S NEW IN THE WOLF'S DEN? 5

The heat and humidity of Northeastern Wisconsin is in full force and at times can be near unbearable. The same can be said if we don't do something about the character defects that have kept us drunk all these years. The sixth and seventh steps of our program give us the opportunity to do just that.

The sixth step reads, "Were entirely ready to have 'God' remove all these defects of character". The Webster New Lexicon definition simply translates the word 'shortcoming as.. "A failure to reach an expected or desired standard of conduct". In the A.A. context it follows the fifth step, after which we had told another person the exact nature of our wrongs, we can make a complete evaluation of how we operate in the world around us. After working the first five steps of our program, we can no longer say to ourselves that we didn't know what the problem with us was.

We now can ask a 'Power greater than ourselves' to remove these defects and restore us to sanity. We have also accepted the fact that we can not change by ourselves. We reach out for help, knowing the hand of A.A. will always be there.

I heard it said at a meeting that step six was all that is wrong with us and step seven is all that is 'not quite right' about ourselves. Step seven reads, "Humbly asked him to remove our shortcomings." In step six we need to have 'faith' and surrender to a 'Power Greater than Ourselves' and in step Seven we must strive to reach the high standards outlined in Alcoholics Anonymous!

When we hear at the meetings that we are trying to learn to 'live sober', it means we are working on our character defects and with the help of 'God' and the tables of A.A. are leading more fulfilling and productive lives. In 'How it Works' of our 'Big Book' it says we are seeking spiritual progress rather than spiritual perfection. As long we stay focused and embrace a 'God' of our understanding we will, because we are human, always have shortcomings. The fact is we will grow along spiritual lines and taking it "One Day at a time", will prosper and grow in this program!
